Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on March 5th. Grace Lutheran Church is offering two opportunities for worship which will include imposition of ashes. Please join us at 11:00am in the sanctuary for an abbreviated Ash Wednesday service or come for worship at 7:00pm in the sanctuary for a full version of the Ash Wednesday liturgy. On Ash Wednesday we begin our forty-day journey toward Easter with a day of fasting and repentance.

Marking our foreheads with dust. We acknowledge that we die and return to the earth. At the same time, the dust traces the life-giving cross indelibly marked on our foreheads at baptism. While we journey through Lent to return to God, we have already been reconciled to God through Christ. We humbly pray for God to make our hearts clean while we rejoice that "now is the day of salvation." Returning to our baptismal call, we more intentionally bear the fruits of mercy and justice in the world. Join our community in marking this important day in the Church Year.

Dear Siblings in Christ,

"In the bulb there is a flower; in the seed an apple tree; in cocoons, a hidden promise: butterflies will soon be free! In the cold and snow of winter there's a spring that waits to be, unrevealed until its season, something God alone can see." ~ Natalie Sleeth

As I write, the temperatures have been rather frigid this past week. Our local area is seeing more ice and snow this winter than in recent years giving us a workout with our snow shovels and ice scrapers. Thankfully, I recently saw colorful seed packets, colorful pots, and bags of soil showing up on store shelves. I find that there's something about these signs of the coming growing season that bring a measure of much needed delight and hope in these final weeks of winter.

Opening a seed packet and sprinkling some tiny seeds into the palm of my hand, I begin to imagine the feel and smell of the rich, dark earth when I will gently poke these little seeds into the ground and cover them over with fresh dirt. I smile in anticipation as I envision the roots begin to take hold while tiny green leaves sprout and stretch upward into the sunshine and air. "Not too much longer," I remind myself. The snow and ice will melt, and spring will come to reveal its season with sure signs of growth and new life

It is with this kind of hopeful expectation that we are engaging a new Lenten season. We enter into this time that invites some measure of vulnerability on our part, which is a hard task, as we try to tell the truth about the brokenness in this world. A time to recognize the brokenness that includes being honest about the ways we fall short of loving our neighbors as ourselves and the life-denying realities that are playing out in the world. This is also a time to name the brokenness in our lives that not only includes, but takes seriously, the pain and suffering we and our loved ones have endured and mourned.

Jesus knows our sorrow. He died a human death on the cross. Our God knows our pain and, perhaps most especially, our grief—and in raising Jesus from the dead, has promised that death does not have the final word. We will begin and make our Lenten walk as Easter people who know the end of the story. God's resurrection promise is ours already even if not yet fully realized. We tell the truth about our brokenness while holding onto hope that God's healing mercy and love are already ours, and that God's grace breaks into the broken places even now, whether or not we are able to see and name them.

Quiet, sleepy little seeds don't generally look too lively when first planted, but in their season, God will reveal new life in them. All of creation rests in God's promise in the cycles of creation that bring about transformation. May these signs of spring be a reminder of our expectant hope in our gracious God that transforms us, too, with the promise of new life.

About this Lenten series "Everything in Between: Meeting God in the Midst of Extremes"

This series, inspired by the Narrative Lectionary (Year 3), allows the Gospel of Luke to guide us through Lent. Beginning with Jesus setting his face toward Jerusalem (Luke 9:51), the series flows through several familiar stories—the Good Samaritan, Mary and Martha, the fruitless fig tree, the Lost Sheep, Zacchaeus, and more. Many of these



stories are well-known in both sacred and secular imagination, carrying cultural relevance and lore. For example, have you ever identified yourself as either a "Mary" or a "Martha?" The "Good Samaritan" title alone could reference a hospital, a Charitable organization, a type of law, or a good deed. Perhaps you grew up singing "Zacchaeus was a wee little man" in Sunday School. So many of these scriptures hold significance in pop culture, church history, politics, and everything in between.

As we studied these scriptures, we were struck by how Jesus' ministry was rooted in relationships that disrupted the established social, political, and religious divides of his time. As modern readers, we sometimes lose the "shock factor" behind Jesus' words, as his teaching tactics likely felt extreme for those in his context. He describes a stigmatized Samaritan as a good neighbor. He emphasizes the value of 1 sheep in a herd of 100. He dines with a tax collector who amassed wealth through extortion. While dying on the cross, he tells a convicted criminal he will soon find paradise. In these narratives, Jesus intentionally highlights the cultural and political polarities of his time to emphasize the radical, inclusive, and surprising love of God. When we study these stories in their historical and cultural context, we see how they mirror the cultural and political divides many of us experience in our families, churches, and communities today.

This series is an invitation to navigate the polarities in our lives with more faith, intention, and openness to be transformed. Each weekly sub-theme explores two supposed binaries, like "faith & works" or "rest & growth," or "grief & hope." We often consider these ideas to be opposing. However, as we explore these concepts within the scriptures, we find nuance and complexity. We find that these dichotomies are false. We might begin to see a full spectrum instead of black and white. We might find that God is present in between.

And so, this season, we invite you to look beyond black and white binaries and easy answers. We encourage you to notice the dichotomies that define our lives, but also imagine where God might be meeting us beyond the categories we create. This theme may resonate with anyone who is in discernment or trying to find their way through an undefined space. It will speak to anyone who feels as if they are living in a divided world. It is for those who seek a spiritual life that engages with complexity instead of avoiding it. This Lent, we're trusting that God shows up in shades of gray, rainbow hues, and everywhere in between.



From the Deacon's Desk: Where do we meet Jesus?

On Sunday, February 16th, the gospel reading was from Luke's Sermon on the Plain. This was Jesus honoring the poor, the hungry, the grieving. This was Jesus honoring the ones who usually get forgotten. And there were woes too - warnings to those who are the ones doing the forgetting; warnings to those who are used to being the ones honored.

Do we meet Jesus on this plain? As Jesus blesses the outcasts of the world from this level place, is he calling us to meet him there? This question has much relevance today as we all may know people who have been directly impacted by the recent flurry of executive decisions from the current administration. Do you know someone who has been impacted? A federal employee? A teacher? A research scientist dependent on government grants? An asylum seeker waiting for a green card? A senior worried about losing Medicare benefits?

How can we stand alongside Jesus to meet those who need blessings more than ever?

The beatitudes calls us to walk in solidarity with those who are on the margins - letting our relationship with them bring us blessing. When we meet them where they are and offer our support, prayers, love, and voices, we are meeting Jesus there on the plain.


Check Out These Ways to Support Your Faith Journey
